

Look up

One of my childhood memories is of going into the garden on a cold winter's evening with my Dad and being invited to stretch up to my full height, screw up one eye and with the other to peer into the tiny eyepiece of a telescope to see what wonders it would reveal. Therein I saw craters and seas on the Moon, Jupiter and its four most visible moons and the curious fuzzy shape of Saturn surrounded by its rings. From our garden we could see more or less as much as Galileo saw when he first pointed his rudimentary telescope to the night sky. I was hooked. At that time space exploration was just beginning with the first Moon landings and artificial probes sent to Mars and Venus.



I was reminded of this early boyhood enthusiasm, and doubtless the rather tedious display of geeky knowledge that went with it, when recently I was walking to the post box one evening and saw the Moon, Jupiter and Saturn in close proximity in the southern night sky. Our awareness of the wonder of these nearby but foreign worlds has been increased many-fold by discoveries over the last 50 years. I used to know the names of the moons of Saturn and Jupiter but now so many more have been discovered remembering their names is impossible. Saturn's rings have proved far more complex, numerous and beautiful on closer inspection.

Worshippers of God have long found the stars and planets in their order and beauty leading them to praise God. 'Lord, our Lord ... You have set your glory in the heavens. When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them?' (from Psalm 8)

Now we know so much more about the universe of stars and galaxies in their mind-blowing number and size flying away from each other at astonishing speed. If you haven't done so lately why not take a moment to step outside on a clear night and look up again. There are many things that serve to keep our heads down, earthbound, at the moment. There is much around to trouble us and to fear but a few moments of lifting up our eyes, chin up, to see what God has made can give us a better perspective, greater awe and cause us to worship and recover the inner 'wow!' A campaign calling for debt cancellation for people who have been swept into unavoidable debt in recent months was launched this week by a group of four denominations including the Methodist Church representing two-thirds of a million Christians and ecumenical charity, Church Action on Poverty. The campaign called 'Reset the debt' calls for the Government to create a Jubilee Fund to provide grants to pay off and cancel unavoidable debt accrued by the poorest households during the lockdown period, giving them a more stable platform from which to face the difficult winter ahead.
